Arranger's note: this famous French tune is really a childrens' 'action song' in which the participants make movements to illustrate the characters mentioned - gentlemen bow, ladies curtsy, soldiers march, babies yell and friends embrace - in fact, a typical French Sunday outing in the park! To avoid misunderstanding over the pronunciation of nonsense syllables such as *dobido* and *damdamdam*, I have tried to use the letters of the alphabet as far as possible in their internationally recognised phonetic sense. For speakers of standard English, *dam* = *dumb*; but for speakers of most other languages, *oo* should be sung as the letter *u*. Everyone is familiar with *dobido*, but try to relax the *do* halfway towards a German *dü*.
